Yes, we all know it, but I guess the real question is, do we live it? Are we looking for ways to apply His words in our lives? Are we practicing Godly giving?

A few years back, my husband and I decided to give our second sofa set to a family in church. It was in great condition. The wife and two daughters recently landed as immigrants and the family just moved into a new apartment. It was around Christmas time and it dawned on me that they would also want a Christmas tree, which most likely is low on their priority list. We had two then: a 7-foot one and a 4-foot one. I loved our small tree. I gingerly decorate that every year with Philippine-made Christmas ornaments that I brought with us to Canada. So naturally, I was attached to it. I hesitated and started negotiating with God. "Can it just be the tree and not ALL the ornaments?" He was silent. You see. I did not need to hear from Him. I needed to obey Him. God wanted us to give that tree (with all ornaments and lights) away. So we packed it up and delivered it the very next day with the sofa set. One thing was

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clear to me that day; I still needed to grow in the area of giving. I mean, if I was struggling with giving away an old Christmas tree, how can He trust me with more, much less wealth? Seriously!

Truth be told, giving is an area that we can all grow in. God is eager to partner with us in answering the prayers of His children. Either in formal ways, like giving to missions and supporting ministries; or through informal ways, like randomly providing a need of a family. While giving might be easy for some, Godly giving will always be a challenge for most. Why? It's because Godly giving requires a measure of dying to self. Let me explain.

Godly giving requires obedience

We give what we determine in our hearts. (2 Cor. 9:7). True. However, we don't determine the amount on our own, we should ask Him. We should listen and obey. We do this when a plea is made in church and should also do it in our every day lives. Like when we're waiting in line to pay at the store and see a man counting every penny in his pocket. Does God want to use you to bless that man? Ask Him, it's His money anyway. It is not so much about the amount or value as it is about obedience. Godly giving requires obedience.

Godly giving is an overflow of love

Godly giving is unconditional and with no strings attached. It is a result of an overflow of God's love in our hearts, and we loving Him back. We must give not to receive. We will for sure receive because that is His promise. Still, we ought to give without any expectations of anything from recipients, even of gratitude. Does that mean we no longer show appreciation or demand accountability? Not at all! We should express gratitude, of course. Organizational accountability

is still important. However, when we start requiring favors or special attention from the recipient, our giving becomes conditional and that is not borne out of love. The self is never the star, God is. Godly giving requires love.

Godly giving is done cheerfully

Our act of giving should be done cheerfully. Sometimes we feel embarrassed that we are unable to give a higher amount or bigger gifts that our giving is sullied with sadness. Other times, we feel forced that our giving is resentful. Then there are those times that we just feel the burdened by giving that we give but we do it reluctantly. Please don't give that way. See, if we are truly giving in obedience and in love, we will choose to give cheerfully. Yes, it's a choice that we make. When we do that, we put a smile in God's face. God loves us all but *God loves* it when the *giver* delights in the giving. (1 Cor. 9:6 MSG). Wow! Isn't that wonderful? Godly giving is done cheerfully.

I'm sure we are all doing a lot of giving this coming Christmas season. I suggest that we all put this to practice and don't just give. Let's practice Godly giving and experience the delight of God. Then it will truly be the most wonderful time of the year.

As Thanksgiving and Christmas approach, many people begin to think about giving and receiving. Just where and when the custom of giving gifts to one another at Christmas began is not known for certain. Perhaps it all started with the men from the east who worshipped the child Jesus in Matt. 2:11. Or maybe the giving of gifts began because Jesus himself is the gift of God to mankind, and because he gave his very life for man's redemption, John 3:16

While contemplating Acts 20:35 one day, it caught my attention: "it is more blessed to give than to receive. But what can I give? With our present circumstances there is not much I can do.

The Holy Spirit softly whispered in my spirit; "Are you willing to give the Bible first place in your heart?" When you realize what the Word of God can and will do in the lives of people in your community. Romans 10:17 says, "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." So how do I put myself in a position of giving?

The witch trials of 1692 cast a shadow over Salem, Massachusetts, that has spanned centuries, this historic coastal city is now a highly profitable tourist draw, about 250,000 each year. Many often chalk this up as a time to have harmless fun. But as believers, we know that it's Satan's scheme to trick man into following him by portraying something as small and innocent. He does this by getting people to compromise on "small" things and before they realize it, he has infiltrated their spirits with many demonic forces.

While distributing bible tracts, God has reminded me also, that just because I don't see the end result of the seed I planted in someone's heart, it does not mean that what I did was nothing. Many people were saved through reading Gospel tracts including myself. It was in my college days when I received my first bible tract, Four Spiritual Laws. Nut Marshmallow Fudge

Ingredients:

- 1 1/3 cup evaporated milk
- 1 12-oz package semisweet chocolate morsels
- 1 cup coarsely chopped nuts
- 1 cup miniature marshmallows

Preparation:

- 1. Line an 8" square pan with waxed paper.
- 2. Combine evaporated milk & sugar in 3-qt saucepan. Place over moderate heat & bring to full rolling boil, stirring constantly (about 4 minutes). Boil 5 minutes, stirring constantly.
- 3. Remove from heat; add chocolate morsels & stir until smooth.
- 4. Fold in nuts & marshmallows. Turn into prepared pan. Chill & cut into squares.

Yield: 3 lbs.

hristmas Baking

Snow Flurry Brownies

Ingredients:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 12 cup baking cocoa
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup vanilla chips
- 1/2 cup chopped macadamia nuts or almonds

Preparation:

- 1. In a bowl, whisk together sugar, butter, eggs, & vanilla.
- 2. Combine flour, cocoa, baking powder & salt; add to sugar mixture & mix well.
- 3. Spread into a greased 8 in square baking pan.
- 4. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 min or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out with moist crumbs (do not over bake).
- 5. Cool on a wire rack. Cut into diamond shapes if desired.
