
# Entrust 2019

National Youth and Young Adults Leaders Conference

After a two year hiatus due to the National Convergence preparations, over 40 youth and young adult leaders from the different WIN churches in the US gathered once again for our National Youth and Young Adults Leaders Conference in Houston, Texas last January 31- February 3,2019. Hosting this year's conference was our WIN Houston Northeast church pastored by Pastor Butch and Ching Mapeso. Due to the success of the National Convergence last July, we had the biggest number of out of town delegates in attendance, 24 all in all coming from our churches in Seattle, Silicon Valley, San Francisco, New Jersey, Los Angeles, Chino, San Diego and Dallas. Both our Houston area churches had their youth and young adults leaders in attendance too. Bro. # A Second Look At Suffering

#### Sufferings contribute towards our Character Formation and/or Behavior Modification.

Most of us believe that adversity is a tool that God sometimes employs for our good and our growth. Most of us don't have a problem accepting suffering as an important instrument God uses to forge Christlike character in us or even correct erring behavior in His children. We seek comfort in verses like Romans 8:28 that generally states "all things being used by Him for our good" or Hebrews 12:6 that expresses His "loving discipline for His children" (both verses paraphrased). With that stated, I think sufferings deserve a second look...

#### **Our Sufferings toward Others' Blessings**

What we may struggle with is the thought that, sometimes, our sufferings serve no other purpose than to bless others! This might come as a shock to some (or even disturbing to others!) but God might allow adversity into our lives so that others (beside yourself) will be blessed. That God would make you go through a difficulty or a negative experience only because He wants to bless others THROUGH you, is a radically new thought for some! After all... it's not about you! As we strive to find the purpose for our sufferings, we should consider a couple of things: that we do not live in a vacuum and we are not the center of the universe. While there is a God who ultimately works out things for our good – it is not always for our comfort nor our benefit. Consider, too, that maybe our sufferings serve to bless others.

#### **Consider the Life of Joseph**

From start to finish, Joseph's story is one of the most colorful in the Bible! His conflict with his brothers and how they got rid of him by selling him to slavery - his story involves trips to the dungeon and the throne room! He had experiences that were both tragic and difficult... *experiences that only make full sense when you think of them as instruments that God was using to bless others!* He says in Gen.50:20 "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives." Joseph lived with that mindset... even naming his second son "Ephraim" (meaning 'fruitful') as in Gen.41:52 "The second son he named Ephraim and said, "It is because God has made me fruitful in the land of my suffering." Joseph's life shows tragedy as a tool used by God to bless others!

#### **Consider the Life of Paul**

"Because of my chains, most of the brothers and sisters have become confident in the Lord and dare all the more to proclaim the gospel without fear." (Phil.1:14). This was Paul (the same Paul with the "thorn in the flesh") saying that his personal troubles have actually emboldened the brethren to proclaim the gospel fearlessly – again, trials that are tools for blessing others!

Before ascending to heaven, Jesus Christ gave His disciples specific directions to follow after they have affirmed their faith. He calls all His followers from all generations to act and share the Gospel throughout the world. Many of them heard this calling and traveled in various places as they spread the word of Christ. They made incredible sacrifices, traveling even to remote regions of the world beyond the civilized cities into jungles and deserts. However, mission fields can also be very close to home. It could be a neighbor who has not heard about Jesus, or a poverty stricken area just down the road where people cannot afford Bibles. In modern times, the internet has become a mission field where people can reach out and share the love of Christ. The places and people who need to hear the Gospel are everywhere. In fact, some of our members are products of social networking like Facebook and Twitter.

On His last reminder, Christ did not only command His disciples to go and make disciple. He also told them the process of how to make disciples. "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo. I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Amen (Matthew 28:19-20) The main verb in this passage is "make disciples," and it is important to examine the two other related commands, "baptize" and "teach." These two verbs are participles of means; the means by which the disciples were to make disciples, to baptize and then to teach them all that Jesus has commanded. It gives us an idea that the two participles provide us the manner of how to grow and mature the newly converted believers. This shows that the way the church makes disciples involves incorporating them into the church as part of the body of Christ and into a local church. They are to be baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and be taught in all aspects of Christian teachings and practices.

In the New Testament, baptism is mentioned in several passages: (Acts 2:38; 8:12, 16, 36, 38; 9:18; 10:48; 16:15, 33; 19:5; 22:16). In these passages, baptism is

closely associated with the proclamation of God's word and immediately after conversion to Christ. It is a public means or activity that identified the new disciples with Jesus Christ and His body, the Church. Baptism in water is the sign of entrance into the body of Christ, the Church, a demonstration of the believer's faith in Christ. Then and now, baptism is a serious business in the church, because it could mean rejection by the family, colleagues, and even resulting in the loss of life in a country where Christianity is not allowed. The gospel of Mark 16:16 says, "He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned." It means that the commission of Christ contains not only truth. encouragement and precepts, but also warnings. Therefore, baptism is closely associated with discipleship training because it identifies the newly converted not only to the church but also to Jesus Christ. It is our assumption that each individual who receives the Gospel is able to clearly understand the Gospel of Jesus and the spiritual significance of water baptism.

When Christ told His disciples to "teach them to observe all things that I have commanded you," this is not only for the new believers but also to all disciples and members of all churches, regardless of rank and position. Everyone needs to be taught in order to grow in the knowledge of Christ. The process keeps going back to the discipled believers. Luke also addressed the importance of teaching: (Acts 2:42; 5:25, 28; 15:35; 18:11, 28:31). The object of the teaching is not simply for the sake of knowledge or to satisfy curiosity. Effective teaching results in a transformed life of a maturing disciple believer. Potential workers and leaders must be taught effectively and consistently to live the teachings of Jesus Christ. This may cause them to grow themselves and become spiritual fathers or mentors to new disciples.

From the beginning of Bible history, the words like writing, knowledge, scrolls, books, pen, understanding, and other things related to "teaching" played an important role for the people of God. Christianity is a teaching religion, and it is rooted in God's revelation

that could know Him and find His perfect will. Christian faith, in some sense is foreshadowed by Judaism which was the first religion in western civilization being guided by the books and scrolls. In fact, one of the things that made Judaism and Christianity unique among the religions of the Roman world was that their faith and practices were based on teachings and instructions from their sacred documents, while all others were based on superstitions and worship of images. During the time of the early church, they emphasized the unique role of the teaching ministry to support the main command "make disciples." It means that through teaching, we make disciples. It is true that men are not saved by the teaching process, nevertheless, the teaching ministry prepares men and women for a deeper relationship with God and His people.

Jesus was a master teacher. He educated those He mentored, and it took time, energy and great patience when He did that. He taught them about prayer (Matthew 26:36-46), heaven (John 14:2-4), hell (Luke 16:20-31), the kingdom of God (Matthew 13), the future events (Matt, 24), and about His purpose, plan, kingdom living, and relationships. He taught in the temple, synagogues, seashores, mountains, hills, plains, roads, and in the villages. Teaching should be the forefront of the mission of all churches worldwide, including WIN-USA, today and always. The focus of our teaching in the cell group, Bible study, evangelism, discipleship training, and the pulpit must be on Jesus Christ who saves us, and on the life-changing encounters with Him. His teachings from the sacred books must be the center of our attention because it will bring us to our allegiance to Christ and Him alone.

In conclusion, to teach is to contribute to the total formation of Christian lifestyle, in words and deeds. Its goal is to provide an authentic knowledge of Christ that the worship of God may continue to impact the whole church where God might use more trained and sincere believers to expand His kingdom. Teaching should be a part of every activity and will be effective if it conveys the way of Christian living.

# WIN-LA Hosts Party for Foster Kids: Christmas is About Sharing God's Love

Last December, WIN-LA hosted a Christmas party for foster kids as part of our community outreach to the underprivileged. We partnered with FosterAll, a non-profit that works with faith communities to touch the lives of young people in foster care. Foster kids are placed in group homes as a temporary safety net due to neglect and abuse at home or because the kids' parents are in jail. Some of them are separated from their siblings because they are classified by age and by gender. Sadly, 50% of all young adults who age out of foster care end up homeless or incarcerated.

We hosted 14 boys, ages 12 to 16, for brunch at the church. They were accompanied by their group home counselors and staff members. Each kid received at least two presents, based on their wish list. The counselors and staff members were also given gift cards.

Spearheaded by Bro. Peng Goh, the event was a collaboration of the Men, Ladies and Youth ministries. We raised funds from church members and solicited gift donations from companies. The men coordinated the breakfast, the ladies shopped and wrapped the presents, and our youth reached out to the kids. They interacted and played games with them. A team decorated the sanctuary and the dining hall. The Pyros team led praise and worship.

Christmas is a very lonely and painful time for these kids. We tried to bring to them the Christmas Spirit and the love of Jesus. My heart was burdened when I met them. Most of them would not look at us in the eye, almost saying, "Leave me alone. Don't ask about my family." One of the boys shared that he has been in foster care for the past ten years and he has been moving from one foster home to another. In November, a few of our men participated in one of the athletic events of FosterAll. They were there to be father figures to these fatherless boys.

None of us are in a position to adopt a kid or to be a foster parent, but in our small way we touched these kids one life at a time.

WIN New York Ladies Brunch

Modern culture constantly bombards us with images of an 'ideal female' being seductive, proud, materialistic and loves to hang around the isles of Macys. On the weekend of January 26, some 30 women defied this norm by gathering together at the church center for fellowship and teachings. It was the first WIN NY Ladies' Ministry fellowship gathering for 2019. Teachings were given on Nehemiah's servant leadership - fitting one's personality and gifts within the body of Christ, practicing practical applications of Scripture by managing time between church and family and the importance of faithfulness in God's work. There is a need for activities that strengthen and encourage Christian women to counter the influences of social media defining femininity as being fragile and passive at best and at worst lazy, neglectful, selfish and irresponsible.

The day began with praise and worship led by Sis Marie and an ice breaker activity that instantly became nostalgic as Sis Romina used a popular child rhyme. Brunch was an array of scrumptious Filipino comfort food lovingly prepared by some of the ladies. Through sharing a meal, we were able to catch up with each other. Participants had the time and space to express their feelings which would not have been met if the ladies gathered after the church service. Most of the time activities after church service were mostly concentrated to iCare groups. It was encouraging to meet and fellowship with other women of the church while recounting past experiences to inspire the new believers who were not there the year before. It was a blessing that each of the women of the church although having their own personal concerns could be a resource to edify someone else (Proverbs 27:17).

After the festivities, we were divided into two groups. The first group of ladies decorated a cake using different techniques with Sis Jal. The second group visualized a Bible verse through illustrations using different color media during the Bible journaling session with Sis Sarah. After about an hour, the groups switched sessions so that all the ladies have had an opportunity to engage in each activity. The lessons were designed to bring out the creativity of each participant and to engage in discourse with sisters in Christ while working with our hands. The aim of both the cake decoration and Bible journaling was to build relationships through heartfelt conversations. Through these low stakes exercises, the ladies felt safe and were able to communicate their desires and gain fresh perspective by consulting with mature Christians.

Issues such as dealing with unbelieving spouses or children, prioritizing prayer and devotion, identifying God's gift for use

in the ministry and frustrations of a single mom were just some of the difficulties that were brought out during the discussions. The discussion addressed problems that lie at the very doors of our homes and churches. Our mission field is wherever God has called us now -- as students in schools, as employees in workplace, as members of church communities, as wives to our husbands, as mothers to our children, sisters to our siblings and as residents in the communities we live in. We asked ourselves the questions on what it means for us to be the woman that God wants us to be in our homes and churches, and what it means for us to be the woman that God redeemed us to be.

The overwhelming positive feedback reinforced the need to fellowship and empower the women of WIN NY to rise up and awaken the lioness within ourselves and use it in the ministry that God has blessed us with. Optimistically in the future, we may open this fellowship to more women who may not be a part of the church and provide a more personal welcome to the new members.

Lastly, rather than conforming to corrupted models of what a real woman should be, a time for individual reflection can realign our character with the God's original design and be transformed by the Bible heroines with a Christian mandate. We are, first and foremost, spiritual creatures made in God's image and are servants made to obey our Maker. Our identity cannot be found in materialistic pursuits which serve to satisfy our physical bodies, but found in living for the glory of God our creator which satisfies the soul. Breaking free of the stronghold of feminine stereotypes, we



realize that -- the student studying hard in school, the worker toiling faithfully on the job, the church member serving the Lord's people, the wife supporting her husband, the mother seeking to bring up her children in the discipline and
