While following all the safety guidelines and preparing for our church's first online VBS, we spent three Thursdays in July volunteering to address the huge homelessness problem in our community.





We helped build "tiny houses!" We prepared and furnished these tiny homes to help the homeless people of Tacoma get back on their feet. In cooperation with The Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI), a local non-profit that has worked on similar projects in the City of Seattle, we volunteered to build these micro shelters. Materials were donated and professional builders were there to train us. The shelters were occupied during the last week of July only a day or two after our last day of volunteering! We are looking forward to working with LIHI again for their future projects in the greater Seattle area.



It is important for our church to serve our city and this was a very effective and tangible way for us, the young people, to learn these values. It was incredibly fulfilling and very gratifying to be used by a big God to build tiny homes!

# **COVID-19 and Church Reimagined**

When (*not if!*) we return to gather for worship and fellowship again, it will not be the same church as before this pandemic. It might be the same place, same time, same folks and the same program and activities – but it will not be *the same!* And (*this is the contention of this article*), <u>this might actually be a good thing!</u>

•Whether we like it or not, we have to REIMAGINE CHURCH.

As the world rapidly changes in reaction to this health crisis – so will the church. After a period of adjustment, the result will either be bleak or a blessing depending on how we reimagine church in the post-pandemic era.

We've always said "**be the church**," well... now is that perfect opportunity! Instead of finding ways to "bring people to church"... we are now asking how we can "be the church where we live, work and play!" Since we could not gather together in our church facility, we had to be creative and resourceful to fulfill our purpose right where we are! Church reimagined!

We've also said "church is WHO, not WHAT"... now we can flesh that out! If we emphasize on "what," leaders will focus on building better structures, processes, facilities and institutions. If we shift to "who," then we are forced to come up with <u>non-institutional expressions</u> of our mission and more <u>incarnational articulations</u> of our duties! Church reimagined!

We've also emphasized phrases and programs like "Leadership Development, Church Planting, Lifestyle Evangelism and Dynamic Discipleship," we have to rethink all of that - not abandon - just *rethink* how they might look like post-pandemically! Then probably ADD IN phrases that sound more like "online outreach, virtual visits and livestream fellowships and contactless connections!" Again, just making the most out of current limitations. *Church reimagined*!

I sincerely look at these times (*pandemic and post-pandemic*) as **opportunities more than obstacles**. Our success still depends on God's grace and anointing, of course! But whether we barely survive or greatly thrive from this point forward depends on whether we adopted a mindset that insists on *"the way we've always done it"* or we enthusiastically reimagined church. And that's the "word on the street"... **REIMAGINE!**

## **Moving On After The Crisis**

We work every day with people who are joyful and optimistic, but some of them are desperate and hurting. We may not be aware of the struggles they handle right now, and the crisis they are going through. Probably because of our busy life and the considerable attention that we give to our ministries, or the heavy works that we are doing in our offices, hospitals, schools, jobs and families, and so often that we don't notice them. Or maybe, to be honest, we are those who are being hurt, lonely, injured, wounded and weak.

One day, the coronavirus crisis will end, and all of us will say that it's safe to go outside, go to the park, visit friends and relatives, go the church, or do the parties. Also, we can do missions, fly the 747, attend the conventions and discipleship programs, with no social distancing and without putting the mask on. However, many doctors and pandemic specialists suggest that until the vaccine is available, it will be necessary to be cautious, and be able to identify who can move freely, specially, those with underlying conditions that need protective measures.

The Bible shows that even God's people are not exempt from suffering, pestilence or crisis. Noah was in crisis for 150 days during the deluge, Moses was in crisis when Korah and his people rebelled against him. Who can forget the suffering of Job? It felt like a never-ending suffering to him. The prophet Jeremiah was in crisis before and during the Babylonian's Jerusalem siege, while Paul was in crisis when he was in prison in Philippi and Caesarea as well. The life of King David was an open book, and many of his Psalms describe his thoughts and everyday concerns. We see his emotions in times of success and jubilation, as well as, pain and agony in time of distress and troubles. For a long time, he suffered persecution in the hand of Saul, conflict with the Philistines, and crisis within his own family. Even in the zenith of his reign, he still had enemies and still had many concerns. But how did he and all other

men and women of God handle these crises and had moved on after going through painful experience. Recovery after the crisis can be a big challenge to all. We are left to recover the pieces of pain and confusion we had to overcome when the crisis smashed into us. Since the Bible did not give us a formula or a step-by-step plan on how to move on and take steps toward the future, what actions should we make to move forward away from the crisis? Here are some of my thoughts.

First, determine your priorities. Before Noah established any action plan, the first thing that he did was to build an altar to the Lord. After removing the animals out from the ark, Noah built an altar to the Lord and offered burnt offerings on the altar (Gen. 8:20). He set up the requirement for worship, first and foremost, and offered sacrifices to God using some of the precious animals from the ark. Similarly, after recovering from the crisis on the census issue, David purchased the ground, today's temple mount in Jerusalem, to build the altar for the Lord. As a result, God heeded the prayers and the plague was withdrawn from Israel (2 Samuel 24:25). Both Noah and David put God first. On the contrary, the Israelites who just came back from Babylonian captivity, began to build their own houses and business to the point of neglecting their religious obligations. The prophet rebuked them, saying: "Is it time for you yourselves to dwell in your paneled houses, and this temple to lie in ruins?" (Haggai 1:4). They failed to see that the reason they were sent back home was "to build Him a house at Jerusalem which is in Judah" as commanded by Cyrus the king of Persia (Ezra 1:2). Indeed, we need the help of God to understand His mind and the meaning of what is going on around us. Pray to discover issues wherein we have offended our Lord. Examples: we neglect our regular Bible Studies and church Sunday service, we don't exactly give our tithes and offerings for fear of financial shortage, we ignore the importance of evangelism even in time of coronavirus, and others.

#### Moving On After The Crisis

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Second, protect yourselves and get proper group *support*. When the famine struck the land of Israel, Elijah was told to go to Zarepath in Sidon, and meet the widow who would support him. He discovered that the widow's food supplies were exhausted and that she was preparing her last meal for herself and her son. But Elijah told her to prepare a meal for him first, then later for her and her son (1 Kings 17:13). At the surface, Elijah seemed selfish and unmindful of others, but there is a principle we can learn from this. In such a time as this, Elijah had to secure his strength first so that he can be more useful to strengthen others. Since the widow listened to him, for the one meal afforded to the prophet, God miraculously increased the small stock which was afforded to her and son for many days during the time of famine. "The jar of flour was not used up, and the jar of oil did not become empty" (v16). The supply of flour and oil came without end during the time of crisis. Therefore, we need to protect and strengthen ourselves first, because we were sent by God to our people not for our own protection and security alone, but on account of our people's faith, that they may be stronger, encouraged and active as they serve the living God.

*Third and last, proceed to the necessary manual works.* Attending manual works such as visiting friends, relatives, and brethren, or doing other ministry works like accounting, payment of bills, or repair of properties that may require our physical attention, has to be done properly. Noah, David and Elijah did the first thing first, then proceeded to other essential manual works. Noah began to cultivate the land to plant a vineyard (Gen. 9:20). David went to Araunah to buy the ground and paid him six hundred shekels of gold for the site (1 Chron. 21:25). Moses, after the crisis with Korah, took action to set up the priesthood ministry of Aaron and his sons (Num 18). In our case, we can do the same, by visiting people who are in pain physically and emotionally, reset the ministry works up, pay the pending bills, answer emails and letters, and the like. However, if we are struggling with this part of the recovery process, why not ask help from others too!

I believe there is no right and wrong way to recover from crisis. We only need to set a goal, in order to at least, lessen disappointments and stresses in order to create a more pleasant environment. Having various courses of action in order to start a new beginning is not easy, it may require a strong spiritual and physical body. But, if we can get through that, with the grace of God, we can move on unto the right direction.

## **Soul Anchor Online Conference**



For the past 16 years since 2004, the highlight of every summer for our youth and young adults was our Soul Anchor Youth and Young Adult Camp. We gather as one body in the mountains of San Bernardino, CA for 3 nights and days. Young people from our WIN Southland churches would come in attendance to know God in an intimate and deeper manner through worship, workshops, teachings, and fellowshipping with one another.

This year's Soul Anchor Regional Camp was scheduled to be held on July 4-7, 2020 at our regular venue at the Oak Glen Christian Conference Center in Yucaipa, CA. However, due to the Covid pandemic, this had to be scrapped and rescheduled to January 2021. We were in quandary on how to have a meaningful activity for our young people during the summer especially since late March to June, students were doing online classes from home and most of the young adults were working from home too.


During the last week of June, I called a meeting with my Pyros leaders to discuss what activity we can do for the summer. I personally just thought of doing a beach or hiking activity when the "safer at home" order or in other words "lockdown" would be lifted. But to my surprise, a group of the younger generation Pyros leaders already had a plan in mind. They had been discussing of doing an online regional conference. I was amazed on how detailed their plan was and how confident they were when they presented their vision since this has never been done before.

Thus, the very first Soul Anchor 2020 Online Conference was birthed last August 7-8, 2020 with theme "United." Our theme verse was taken from *Hebrews 10:2-25 "Let us hold tightly without wavering to the hope we affirm, for God can be trusted to keep his promise. Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works. And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another, especially now that the day of his return is drawing near"* which we believe was very appropriate with the times we are in that in spite of not being able to gather in person for camp, bibles studies and other activities, we can still be united and connected to one another. Facebook and Instagram were used to promote the online conference. We were able to gather 104 young people from 11 different WIN churches in the US and had also a few young

In between these 2 sessions, we had breakout messages geared to respective age groups with the message on how to "Connect To People." Sandra Cordero spoke to the young professionals; Rizza Aldaba shared to the college group with Ashley Briones and Jonathan Cardeno speaking to the high school and middle school group respectively.

God did a new work in each one of us during the online conference whether it was during the worship time, sessions, breakouts and discussion time. Everyone who attended felt


