## **Worship at the Park**

There was a deep longing in our hearts to pray and worship together in the presence of the living God. Although our church resumed our in-person worship service at the end of May, attendance was limited. The strict safety protocols did not allow us to have much interaction and fellowship. The seniors were encouraged to stay home. We felt we needed to come together in an open air setting to pray and release our praise and worship to God.



We first planned for a one-time gathering at 7:30 am at a secluded area in Brand Park but ended up gathering for eleven Saturdays. First, a lady joined us for worship and asked if we will be back the following Saturday. That made us decide to meet again. On the following week, a hiker joined us and said he will bring his friends next time because they miss in-person worship. So, we decided to extend for another Saturday. He came back the next week with a couple of friends, and then came again and again. Some of the ladies started bringing friends to join us.



During those times of unrestricted, socially distanced praise and worship, we prayed for America and cried out to God to bring revival. On one of the Saturdays, we held the outdoor worship at the Bonnie Brae House where the Azusa Street Revival started in Los Angeles in 1906. We also joined the tent gathering at Azusa Street the following week to re-dig the wells of revival. Our last gathering at the park was the culmination of WIN-LA's 10 Days of Prayer for the nation.



We believe our prayers and our worship are filling the bowls in heaven as described in Revelations 8:3-5. Even if we do yet see the results in the natural, we know that our prayers are mixed with the fire of God. In His perfect timing the prayer bowls in heaven will tilt and God will pour out answers to our prayers.

## **Empowering Future Leaders**

Covid-19 has brought disruption in our society even in all churches, giving much attention on how each one handles specific situation. Social distancing, face masks, and hand washing have played special support to contain the spread of the deadly virus through the difficult year of 2020. After nine months of fear and doubt since March of this year, vaccines are now being rolled out. Yet some church leaders think that the next three months or four will be even more challenging, since some of the things and works in the church may not return to their old ways, as to how they were before.

Some members are now used to attending Sunday services via Zoom or Facebook live streaming, and social media serves as a tool and platform for evangelism, giving, and discipleship. However, we need to take into consideration the probable effect of social media to build up real and tangible relationship with others. In other words, people might feel connected, but they can really be more distant from us. The true and sincere Christian fellowship requires personal involvement and biblical engagement with people as we really are. In doing so, we can honestly handle our strength and weaknesses, and grow together in Christ.

Avery Dulles' book titled *Models of the Church* wrote that it is helpful for church leaders to examine the true meaning of the terms 'disciple' and 'discipleship,' otherwise, we might produce either weak or phony disciples. People's development should not be set aside by the church leaders, rather it must be integrated in the life process within the ministerial work. While limited activities and lockdown remain imposed in various places, the church leaders must begin to find ways at the moment to keep the church workers and ministry heads engaged till the virus ends. For sure, this crisis needs to be handled carefully with godly wisdom to maintain the momentum and continuity of the ministry in the long process.

Empowering leaders is necessary because leadership is what will cause the change and transformation of the church and community. When I started to facilitate the mission and church planting of our local church, the plan usually came up with discipleship training as a major goal for the effectiveness of the ministry. This plan started with the question about the goal of our church. In other words, what is that thing that we want to accomplish? We know that we have talented and potential members that will bring more growth for the ministries, and yet we need to disciple them properly. Below are some tips when creating a leadership program as we empower future leaders of the local church.

First, meditate on the book of the law day and night (Joshua 1:8). God has instructed Joshua, first things first, to do this exercise so he can be sure to obey all that is written in it. Meditation of God's word is the key to knowing God in a deeper way. A true relationship with God is not based on a loud voice and speeches, but by spending time with Him in silence and listening to His voice. Meditation is a way of experiencing God through Christ beyond what our finite mind can understand. To achieve this, pastors and church leaders must lead by example, owning up to their actions as a vital part of who they are as a person.

Second, encourage bravery as well as experience. Doing ministry requires risk, and we must be willing to take it. In the case of Joshua, he saw the parting of Red sea, the coming of water from the rock, the miraculous provision of manna and quail, the appearance of God's presence before their eyes, and much else. All of a sudden, Moses died and Joshua became the head of Israel. God assured him that as He was with Moses, so He will be with Joshua (John. 1:5). We need to keep in mind that it is God who owns the ministry, and the strength of the future leaders must be found in God alone. Moses

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was the leader for 40 years, and Joshua was to take over; full of experiences. Experience is necessary, it gives the future leaders a free hand to explore their potential. Nevertheless, future leaders are not free from fears and doubts, they need to be encouraged that God will be with them, if they continue to be faithful with Him. That's the reason why the Lord encouraged Joshua several times: "Be strong and courageous."

Third, know the difference between God's will and personal skill. It is one thing to have the ability and education to do the job, and another thing to do it according to the will of God. The Bible tells that people are responsible for their actions, but it also tells that it is God who is in control. Though He is sovereign, within the context of His sovereignty, He granted us freedom to act that we are responsible too. Even the church environment in which He chose for us is less than perfect. We are not exempt from afflictions and difficulties, and therefore dispute happens under the sovereign control of the Lord. Sometimes it happens because of our fallen circumstances in which we live, or because of the actions made by others. For this reason, it is necessary for the leaders to know that God requires skills to handle the situation, but know as well that it is always under the ultimate oversight of God who rules in the affairs of men and women. God's will rules!

Fourth, show your future leaders that you believe in them and they own their ministry. When people feel valued, they are more likely to go above the expectations. Tell them that you believe that God called them, and that He brought them with you for a specific task. Share your past experience with God including your personal devotion and vision, with the intent of inspiring them to do more and aspire better for the Lord. As you put them in charge of a specific ministry, support them as if they owned it. Believe that future leaders need to see how the growth of the ministry actually depends on the decision they make. Along the way, mistakes will follow, but allow them to make corrections if their decision proves to be wrong. After all, how will you taste success if you have not tasted failure?

Fifth, let the future leader distinguish the difference between ministry and career. Church work must be understood that we are building a ministry not a career. We are not pleasing men but God, we are God's partner, not of the world. We cannot have both God and world as our boss at the same time (Matt.6:24). God gave us a ministry for His glory, and through that ministry He can change us to be a person that He wants us to be. Most of the time, we are eager to change others, without knowing that God is more interested in our personal change. Our goal is to be able to move God's heart, that we may be able to move men's hearts. Knowing this will encourage our people to go the extra mile and enhance their feeling of freedom and enjoyment in the ministry.

As me move to 2021, let us be flexible to the new changing work of God in our midst. Creating a new focus on the coming year by knowing His ways through past experiences can help create the feeling of a fresh start, as if they have been done and has already happened.

The Bible says God's Church is unstoppable (Matthew 16:18). Crisis turns people inward, but God sent the Church outward. This is not a time to survive but thrive.
