Deborah's Fire Goes to Skid Row

Every year, the Deborah's Fire Ladies Ministry of WIN - LA raise money for the annual Blankets for the Homeless program. But this year was different. Instead of dropping off blankets at the rescue mission, we personally went to Skid Row three times to give out 180 brand new blankets, toothbrush kits, hand sanitizers, clothes, and shoes. More than the distribution, the ladies had the opportunity to talk to the homeless, call them by name, pray and tell them that Jesus loves them.

The Skid Row neighborhood is the epicenter of the homeless population in Los Angeles where about 8,000 people live in tents. Deborah's Fire partnered with Hope House of Prayer-Skid Row, a ministry that sets up a worship tent every Saturday and has established friendships with the community.

I can truly say that worship shifts the atmosphere. A resident shared that when the team comes to minister, people in nearby tents turn off their loud music and chaos stops. It was a joy to see several homeless people receive prayer with tears in their eyes. There were also Christian residents who have become "regulars" and prayed, sang, and played with the band. And even when they do not come near the worship tent, the seed is being planted as the sound of worship, testimonies, the Word, and prayers is heard in the streets. We cannot solve the homeless crisis, but we can bring hope and touch lives one person at a time.





Here, Paul, who has gone on several missionary journeys, planted dozens of churches, shared the Gospel to thousands of people and wrote so many books in the New Testament gives us this great example. We should be continually growing or changing from glory to glory, maturing in our walk and in our relationship with the Lord. We will never be perfect because only Jesus is perfect, but we can strive to be perfect.

Friends when we are contented with our spiritual lives we are in a dangerous condition, because when we are in that condition, the next thing that happens to us is we stagnate and don't grow. When we stagnate and don't grow, the most likely thing that will happen to us is we drift away, or we become toxic or polluted in our spiritual lives. If we are honest with ourselves, we all know of people who have drifted away this year. When we are not contended where we

The WORD on the STREET

Proclaiming Christ or Promoting the Church's Brand?

These pandemic years have forced churches to adjust and conduct virtual services (online, streaming and video-conferencing) just to reach members and gather for Sunday service! It was very challenging in the beginning and definitely a struggle... until lately. Now, most churches have adapted and are becoming proficient with the "hybrid mode" (combining in-person and virtual modes) of doing church. Many churches have invested on technology that allows them excellent livestreams and broadcasts that are at par with (if not better than!) the professionals!

Branding techniques include the use of catchy jingles, popular taglines, captivating logos or cute mascots.

We've heard of churches hiring marketing professionals who use words like 'branding' and 'clickbaiting'. "Branding" is that component of marketing that seeks to promote one's "distinguishing proposition"... highlighting the characteristic of one's product or service that sets it apart from the competition. Branding techniques include the use of catchy jingles, popular taglines, captivating logos or cute mascots... anything to get people to click or look.

The danger (and tendency) of this trend is two-fold:

- 1. the development of a "celebrity culture" over the centrality of Christ, and,
- 2. the promotion of the "church's brand" over the proclamation of the Gospel.

There should be nothing and no one above Jesus – pandemic or no pandemic – the church's message is centered on Christ.

We definitely need great speakers and excellent musicians... the lights and the "likes" are all good signs that the church's reach is far and wide. But, the problem is when the services turn into entertainment instead of worship, when the focus is no longer Jesus but the vessel that's supposed to proclaim Jesus! The church is in deep trouble when we give in to the tendency of promoting the "church's brand" over proclaiming the Gospel. There should be nothing and no one above Jesus – pandemic – the church's message is centered on Christ.

Let's keep Christ at the Center of it All and keep Proclaiming His Gospel! That's the warning and the reminder and the 'Word on the Street' for us.

The Happiness of Contentment

Happiness is a word that is not easy to define. It differs from person to person; each one has a distinct perception and picture of being happy. The ancient Greek sought wisdom and virtue in order to be happy. Others find their happiness with wealth, health, career, marriage, or success. Yet, finding happiness can be a difficult task. In the Bible, God wants His people to be happy, and He cares about our happiness. The prophets, sages, and the apostles believed that if happiness is essential to life, it should also be essential with God.

In the Decalogue, God shows us that human beings can discover true happiness in life. Happiness is available in this world, and this is the result of worthy pursuits and a healthy relationship with God. Those who seek God's Word and the things God loves, can understand the true meaning of happiness. When God spoke from mount Sinai and laid out the Ten Commandment to the Israelites, one of the laws or instructions that He declared was; "Thou shall not covet... (Exo. 20:17). Here includes the neighbor's house, wife, male servant, female servant, ox, donkey, or anything that belongs to a neighbor, or things that are out of our reach. Yet, many in all levels of the society rarely even think about this specific command. but always break this one that hurts our economic system, our world, our society, family, even church, and day-to-day thoughts.

The Hebrew word for "covet" is chamad (תַחַח) which means "lust" or "strong desire." It tells that a person desires something that someone else has, just for his or her own gratification. The Bible contains lots of warning and examples of negative and adverse consequences for coveting something that does not belong to us. The Lord forbids us from wrapping our hearts and minds with material desires because this may pull us away from God. Both Old and New Testaments commands us to govern our hearts with the ways of the Lord. The Lord Jesus warned his disciples that they can't have two masters; for you either love the one and hate the other; listen to one and work against the other (Matt. 6:24). He meant that

we cannot have both God and riches as our bosses at the same time.

God's command of covetousness, which is the Tenth Commandment, aims to check our personal desire and tendency. Having the right mindset leads to correct attitude, but wrong thought may lead to wrong attitude. The issue about covetousness is the "attitude of getting." Our human nature always want to have one thing and another thing; toward selfishness and dissatisfaction. The intent of God for His people is to be holy and happy, and this particular commandment lays the question on true happiness. Obeying it will make us happy, but disobeying it will make us discontent and miserable. Our surroundings can prove that this is true. Rich people want to be richer; politicians want to gain more power, businessmen stir up the interest of consumers, and despite having so much, people are always demanding and craving for more.

Since we experience a variety of activities and emotions every day, it would be helpful to find an alternative on a regular basis; that is, the virtue of contentment. The Apostle Paul exhorted young Timothy when he said: "Now godliness with contentment is great gain" (1 Tim. 6:6). Prior to this verse, Paul told Timothy that many Christians including leaders, during his time, were greedy for money, hard-headed, envious, and often seeking to obtain what others have. However, those material things are not the true gain in life, neither profitable for godly ministry. On the contrary, the real gain and profit in serving God is the virtue of contentment; and they are great gain indeed. The false believers are not gaining the favor of God, they are actually losing God's favor for wrong attitudes. In addition, Paul also wrote to the Philippians saying: "I have learned in whatever state I am, to be content." (Phil 4:11). It means contentment can be learned, and Paul gained understanding to live with little or plenty because he knew God could supply his needs. But how is godliness with contentment great gain? Here is the

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the answer; the more content you are, the more satisfied you will be, and this is great gain. In opposition, the less content you are, the more desires and difficulties you will have, and you will not be happy for the rest of your life, and this is a great loss.

A human being has a spiritual emptiness that only God can fill up. King Solomon in his book of Ecclesiastes had attempted to enter all kinds of entertainment and enjoyment in life, gain all forms of wisdom and knowledge, penetrate the mystery and obscurity in life through pagan religions, but only to conclude that life is empty and is vanity. Without God, we are incomplete! If we try to fill that emptiness with worldly things, it will never be filled. It will only create misery, confusion, uncertainty and failure. But if you give up the "attitude of getting" and surrender it to Christ, those fleshy tendencies, including covetousness will die out naturally. Remember that breaking the Tenth Commandment is also breaking the First Commandment, because we put the pleasure of worldly things ahead of God. Therefore, let us cultivate contentment in order to experience the blessing of true happiness.
